1.2 What activities has your organisation undertaken to promote sustainable palm oil, the RSPO and/or RSPO members in the reporting period?

Finalizing ESA Tropical Peat View project in collaboration with Indonesian government (LAPAN, BRG). For this project a complete Near Real Time peat forest monitoring system has been developed and is now fully operational for entire Borneo with data back to 2016 up to Oct 2019. With WWF the TPV is being updated up to current. We propose a follow up of the TPV for all peat areas in Indonesia, including detection of hydrology changes underneath the peat forest canopy, and extended with selective logging detection. This system can be used by RSPO members to monitor illegal logging and classifying forest areas that are not suitable for palm oil plantation. In addition the system allows the detection of undesired draining of peat forest into former drainage canals causing a high vulnerability for fire of peat forest areas near the plantations. Further we created for WWF an updated palm oil plantation map for Borneo for the year 2017.
